

A large part of our ritual is allegorical and symbolical. We never learn the real secrets of Freemasonry until we learn something of the meaning of our allegories, until we are able to give interpretations to some of our Symbols. The effort will prove an entrancingly interesting one.

The Temple of King Solomon, so spacious and so Magnificient, and constructed by so many celebrated artists — greatest structure of all times — is a Symbol of the Living Temple, more spacious and more magnificent and constructed by an even more celebrated artist. We certainly have within us a Holy of Holies for the worship of the Great Artifices of the Universe, who gave us this Temple, this building not made with hands, finished without with the burnished gold of service to our Fraternity and within with the Precious Jewels of Love of our fellows.

This Mortal Temple in imitation of the other, may be brought low by profidy, by intemperance, by flauunting disregard of the laws of God, nature and reason, and also it may be rebuilt, for nature is quick to repair if given opportunity, but let us be warned that, like the Temple on Mount Morian, this Mortal Temple, when once destroyed, may never be rebuilt in its original splender, also this Temple shall crumble and mingle with its present dust. Whether its glory lives after depends upon the use to which we put it while it is ours.
