There were 5 and 10 cent stores, where you bought things for five and ten cents. Joe Torelli sold ice cream cones for a nickel or a dime. For one nickel you could make a phone call, buy a Pepsi or enough stamps to mail one letter and two postcards. You could buy a new Chevy for \$600., but who could afford one; a pity too, because gas was 11 cents a gallon!!

In our day, cigarette smoking was fashionable, GRASS was mowed, COKE was a cold drink and POT was something you cooked in. ROCK MUSIC was a Grandma's lullaby and AIDS were helpers in the Principal's office.

We were certainly not before the difference between the sexes was discovered but we were surely before the sex change; we made do with what we had. And we were the last generation that was so dumb as to think you needed a husband to have a baby!

No wonder we are so confused and there is such a generation gap today!!!

Back then we had members waiting to take a chair in the Lodge. Members willing to help out, to instruct new members, to participate in fund raising projects and to join work parties doing Lodge projects.

It seems we have come a long way and have gotten nowhere. Won't you consider helping out, and let your intentions be known, we have something for everyone.
