Only a few short weeks ago, the ground was covered with snow and ice. All of South Jersey became a playground — kids were sledding and having snowball fights, snowmen dotted the yards throughout the neighborhood. While I, too, enjoyed the first good snow we'd had in years, I was concerned about the young evergreen in my backyard. No longer a sappling, the tree stood as tall as the house. But its slender trunk could not support the burdensome weight of ice and snow which the blizzard had dumped on its branches, and its treetop bent over until it touched the ground. I felt helpless to save the tree, and anxiously awaited the warming sun which would melt the ice and snow away.

A few days later, I ventured out to the back corner of the yard, expecting the tree to be in the same crippled position, or even broken in two, but the tree was standing! It's trunk was a little curved, but it had survived. I took a rope and tied it near the top of the tree, and secured it to the roof. This was all the encouragement this hearty tree needed to stand tall and straight. One month later, the tree is no worse for the wear.

Now as I walk through my yard, I take pleasure in the radiant colors of the spring flowers. Spring is the season of rejuvenation after all. Rebirth is evident everywhere. Yet, it is with wistful sadness that I welcome the blooms of springtime. Yes, their beauty is undeniable, their fragrance sweetens the air. But they are as delicate as they are beautiful. The ones that don't whither from the summer sun will die come the first frost of fall, not to reappear until they are coaxed by next years gentle spring sun and April showers.

I have noticed parallels between freemasonry membership and the foliage in my yard. There are some members that, like spring flowers, need coaxing and encouragement to attend meetings. Their presence is as eagerly anticipated as those beautiful blooms, but they are missed in the interims, and we hope and wonder when they will come again. Others are like the evergreens. They are the steadfast and reliable, attending most every meeting, participating eagerly. Their presence is predictable and comforting.

I gained a new appreciation for the evergreens this spring. Yes they may seem to fade into the background with the appearance of the colorful spring blooms. But come fall, they will survive. And theirs will be the only sign of life in the bleak of winter. Surrounded by gray and brown, the evergreen's brilliant color will be the winter yard's glory.

Let us be inspired by the rebirth of spring. Let this be a time to recommit ourselves to the brotherhood. But let your true resolve be to emulate the evergreen; for, like the evergreen, it is steadfast and reliable membership which is the backbone of the lodge.
